- c) Comment on factors of ethnolinguistic identity and informal domains of use:
Masurian is like silesian not recognized by Poland, also like in silesian there are discussion that is it dialect or language.
Many masurians consider masurian as a language. Today we do not have many masurians speakers (from 5-15 k). Majority we speak about separate people in Masuria region, there are two communities living today in Siberia, one is Znamienka and other one Aleksandrówka. In 1925 more than 40 k people decided to put masurian as their native language(also in 1900 or 1910 <http://mazurska.eu/index.php/cechy-mowy-mazurskiej/>).
